### **Overbrook Timeline History**

### - Continued from last Issue

1951 (February 24) – Riverview Community Church dedicated on the former site of the Overbrook Gospel Tabernacle at 2 Prince Albert Street.

1952 (May 26) – Rideau River Footbridge is swept downstream by strong currents. It was not rebuilt.

1952 (September 2) – William and Martha Lewis sell a 4-acre plot to Ottawa Lowren Housing Company Limited for a 58-unit low rent housing project on the north side of Presland Road with occupancy to begin on May 1, 1953. This was Ottawa's first low rent project. The streets were named for Mayor Charlotte Whitton. This replaced temporary

housing units in converted war barracks at Rockcliffe and Uplands that the federal government was gradually reclaiming. During 1953 to 1955, many additional low rent units were built by the same company on King George, Queen Mary and Prince Albert. The French speaking counterpart, Le Bon Logis d'Ottawa, decided on a different concept, building inexpensive single-family homes with the potential of rent to own.

1953 (January) – RCMP Headquarters opens at Hurdman's Bridge at a site originally built to be a Roman Catholic Seminary

1953 (June 8) – Halim 'Al' Ferris Saikali, known for Al's Steakhouse on Elgin Street acquires a house at 115 Glynn Avenue where he lived until the house was sold on July 7, 1969. In 1952, he opened his first restaurant, the Riverside Tea Room at 1082 Riverside Drive, in the same building that formerly housed Prest Meat Market.

1953 (September) – Our Lady of Presentation Separate School opens at 1151 North River Road. It was renamed St. Ignatius School in 1961. Closed in June 1972. It is now Shiloh Holiness Church.


1953 (September) Bill Dineen (1932-2016) who grew up at 16 Queen Mary Street, signs with the Detroit Red Wings, where he played from 1953 to 1958 and played on two Stanley Cup winning teams in 1954 and 1955. He retired from playing hockey in 1971. From 1972 to 1978, he was head coach of the Houston Aeros of the World Hockey Association, and after coaching in the minors for several years, he finished his coaching career as head coach of the Philadelphia Flyers in 1992 and 1993. In 1973, he convinced former teammate Gordie Howe to come out of retirement, to play with his sons Mark and Marty Howe with the Houston Aeros. His son, Kevin has had a lengthy NHL and coaching career including one season with the Ottawa Senators in 1999-2000.

1953 (October 14) – Bon Logis subdivision is registered under Plan 588 by Bon Logis d'Ottawa Limited. This was a single-family home project that was Ottawa's second low rental project.

1954 (June 14) – Castle Heights subdivision is registered under Plan 613 by Alesther Marion H. Cameron with the contractor being Castle Heights Construction Company Ltd.

1955 (September) – Queen Mary Public School opens at 557 Queen Mary Street

1955 (October 16) – St. David's Presbyterian Church opens at 473 Donald Street. It closed on September 15, 1968, when it merged with St. Martin's Church on St. Laurent Boulevard.



1955 (December 12) – St. Paul's Separate School opens at 437 Donald Street. It was renamed St. Michael's Catholic School in 2001.


1955 (December 19) – The New Hurdman's Bridge opens, which eventually is used by the Queensway

1957 – Tel Aviv Tennis Club closes. The clubhouse was demolished in late 1958. The club property was sold to the Federal District Commission on January 18, 1954.

1957 – St. Michael Separate School opens at 741 Bernard Street. It was merged with St. Paul Separate School in 2001 under the name St. Michael Catholic School. The Bernard Street school was demolished by 2003.

1957 (October 15) – Queen Elizabeth launches **Queensway** construction at Hurdman's Bridge.

1958 (March 6) – Dominion Store opens at 995 Riverside Drive (North River Road) and the corner of Donald Street. The Dominion Store was sold on September 28, 1971. BouClair's House of Fabric opened on March 30, 1972 and closed in 1988. The property was sold to Waterbrooke Development Ltd. on October 31, 1988. A condominium and Freehold Townhouse development replaced the store in 1990-1991.





Bon Logis subdivision Plan 588




Castle Heights Plan 613


- 1959 Riverside Kingdom Hall of Jehovah's Witnesses opens at 150 Donald Street.
- 1959 (September) St. Laurent Separate School opens at 1161 St. Laurent Blvd. It closed in June 1984 and was demolished by 2005.
- 1959 (December 16) Francis Xavier Laderoute Jr., the founder of Overbrook dies.
- 1959 (December 24) The Alta Vista Queensway interchange (now Vanier Parkway) opens to traffic. At this point, southbound Russell Road was closed at Hurdman's Bridge and the old 1906 Hurdman's Bridge is closed to motorized traffic.
- **1960** (November 25) The **Queensway opens** from Hurdman's Bridge to Green's Creek.
- 1961 St. Ignatius the Martyr Roman Catholic Church at 518 Donald Street opens as an Anglophone parish.
- 1961 Notre Dame de la Présentation Catholic Church relocates to 245 Donald Street as a Francophone parish. Saints Peter and Paul Melkite Catholic Church takes over the North River Road site.
- 1961 St. Sebastien Roman Catholic Church at 1000 Frances Street opens. The parish was established in 1959 to serve the Francophone community in Overbrook.
- 1961 (July 14) An improved Strathcona Beach opens with a sandy shoreline, lifeguards, and portable change rooms. Officially, it had this name for many years but it was popularly known as Dutchy's (Dutchie's) Hole, a favourite swimming spot opposite from Overbrook and north of the 'Black Bridge', the most northerly of the railway bridges at Hurdman's Bridge. In 1968, a permanent beach building was constructed. Pollution became a major issue for all City of Ottawa beaches in 1970. With the city using the Strathcona location as a winter snow dump, a slaughterhouse being a short distance upstream, and cross contaminated storm sewers releasing affluent particularly after rainstorms, the pollution readings were particularly high at Strathcona. The following year, Strathcona Beach was closed permanently. Other popular Overbrook swimming spots included the 'Sparks Rapids' just south of the footbridge where the water was very shallow in the summer, 'First Rock', 'Second Rock', 'Third Rock' and the 'Black Bridge'.
- 1961 (September 22) Aladdin Bowling Lanes opens at 435 Donald Street. It closed in 2000.
- 1965 (July) St. Lucy's Hall closes and was replaced with a house not long after.
- 1966 (June 15) CPR abandons tracks through Overbrook (Sussex Street subdivision).

- 1965 (October 8) St. Paul's Anglican Church is dedicated at 194 Prince Albert Street. It closed at the end of 1996.
- 1966 (June 15) CPR abandons tracks through Overbrook (Sussex Street subdivision).
- 1966 (July 31) The New Ottawa railway station opens on Tremblay Road replacing the downtown Union Station.
- 1966 (September 6) Vanier Composite Separate School opens as a Francophone boy's vocational school at 225 Donald Street which became Centre Polyvalent J.M and Centre Polyvalent Vanier. They became girl's and boy's vocational schools respectively and were operated by the Ottawa Separate School Board. In September 1971, it became École sécondaire Cartier (Sir Georges Etienne Cartier High School) operated by the Ottawa Board of Education.
- 1966 (November 8) The Hurdman Interlocking Tower is demolished.
- 1966 (November 18) The Overbrook Community Centre opens at 33 Quill Street.
- 1967 (April) Rose Fitzgerald Kennedy School for the intellectually disabled opens at 181 Donald Street. The school was officially opened by American Ambassador Walter Butterworth on September 27, 1967 and honours the mother of American President John F. Kennedy.
- 1967 (June 7) The Ottawa and District Adult Training Centre is officially opened at 161 Donald Street. It was renamed the Loeb Centre in 1983. The project had been funded in 1966 by Bertram Loeb on condition that the donation remain anonymous for 15 years.
- 1967 (October 4) St. Laurent Shopping Centre opens.
- 1968 (Fall) Demolition of the two CNR bridges near Hurdman's Bridge including the 'Black' bridge closest to Overbrook.
- 1969 Removal of the concrete piers of the two CNR bridges near Hurdman's Bridge.
- 1971 (September) McArthur High School opens at 485 Donald Street, an Anglophone vocational school. Originally, this was to be the site of the bilingual Sir Georges Etienne Cartier High School but when 225 Donald Street became available, the school was split by language, with Cartier going to 225 Donald Street. Renamed Ottawa Technical Secondary School in 2001.
- 1977 (March) Rose Fitzgerald Kennedy School at 181 Donald Street is renamed École Jeanne-Lajoie to better reflect the Francophone student base. The school honoured Jeanne Lajoie who was a 1920's pioneer Francophone educator from Pembroke. The school closed in June 1996. It became and adult school named Éducation sans frontières in September 1997 and Éducation Per-

- manente by 2007.
- 1980 (October 31) Vanier Parkway opens between McArthur Avenue and Presland Road. The ramps at the Presland/North River Road intersection that predated the opening of the Vanier Parkway were removed in 2007.
- 1980 (March 30) The new Saints Peter and Paul Catholic Church at 1161 North River Road opens. Demolition of the 1942 church and rectory is completed on July 15, 1980
- 1983 (September 7) The old concrete Hurdman's Bridge is closed to cyclists and pedestrians because of safety concerns.
- 1985 Riverside Kingdom Hall at 150 Donald Street is sold. It becomes Eglise Baptiste Evangelique du Bon Berger and in 1995 Eglise Baptiste Evangelique Ebenezer.
- 1986 The 1906 Hurdman's Bridge is demolished.

1987 (April 2) – Official opening of Fire Station # 13 (now # 56) at 275 Coventry Road.

1988 – Alta Vista/Vanier Parkway Queensway interchange is redesigned. Tremblay Road is fully re-routed south of the interchange and the Tremblay Road bridge over the Queensway is demolished.

1993 (April 17) – The Ottawa Lynx Baseball Park (now known as RGCT Park – Raymond Chabot Grant Thorton Park) opens.

1993 (July 23) – St. Charbel Maronite Catholic Church purchases Notre Dame de la Présentation Catholic Church at 245 Donald Street. The parish was established in 1985 at 87 Mann Avenue (261 Russell Avenue).

1997 – Ottawa East Seventh Day Adventist

**Church opens** in the former St. Paul's Anglican Church building at 194 Prince Albert Street.

1997 (September) – École Jeanne-Lajoie at 181 Donald Street becomes the Francophone adult education school Éducation sans frontières. It later became Éducation permanente.

2000 - Hampton Inn at 100 Coventry Road opens

**2001** (September) - **Ottawa Technical Secondary School** opens at 485 Donald Street

**2001** (December 12) - The **Rideau Lawn Tennis Clubhouse** is destroyed by fire.

**2002** - Le Centre Franco opens at **345 Donald Street**, formerly the site of the Aladdin Bowling Lanes.

2003 - St. Michael's Catholic School at 741 Bernard Street is demolished.

2005 - The Ottawa Conference and Event Centre opens at 200 Coventry Road.

2008 - The Second Sparks House at the corner of Ontario Street and Marguerite Avenue is demolished. It is replaced the following year by River Court Lofts.

2012 (March) - Courtyard by Marriott Hotel opens at 200 Coventry Road.


**2013 - Overbrook Community Association** is incorporated.

**2015** (February 9) - The **Coventry Pedestrian and Cycling Bridge** opens over the Queensway connecting the RGCT Baseball Park to the Eastern Transitway land (and subsequently the C onfederation Line). It was later renamed the **Max Keeping Bridge** on May 11, 2016, to honour the late CTV Ottawa News Anchor and community activist.

**2015** (December 4) - The **Adawe Pedestrian Bridge** opens.

**2017** (August 21) – The **Rideau Lawn Tennis Club** closes and is sold to the current owner, the **Rideau Sports Centre**.

**2019** (September 14) - The Confederation Line (LRT) opens for service. The closest station serving Overbrook is Tremblay Station adjacent to the VIA Rail Station.




